It is often stated that education is free and questions then are asked about why families pay for anything at school. The fact is that the 'free' part of education is the tuition or teaching of all students but not all the resources we use in class. Essential items are paid for by families and provide items for everyday use as well as maintenance for computers (lower Primary area), diaries, access to online programmes and consumable materials in all classes. Payment of these items supports us to provide everything a student needs in a classroom. Optional items like excursions, camps and music lessons are paid for separately as they do not form part of our essential items list. I hope that this will explain why education is 'free' but not really 'free'.

Mosquitoes

Last week we had the outside areas of the school sprayed to reduce mosquito issues. We also have some mosquito repellent at school available for use by staff and students. However, if you would like to provide repellent for your child or apply repellent before they come to school, this may help to prevent any potential mosquito-borne infections. The Department of Education have issued the following message:

Staying safe from mosquitoes

Recent wet and warm weather has increased mosquito breeding. Mosquitoes can carry diseases that may be passed on to people through mosquito bites. A range of mosquito-borne diseases have recently been detected in mosquitoes in northern Victoria. Mosquito-borne diseases can cause serious illness, including infections of the brain, with children particularly at risk.

The best way to prevent mosquito-borne diseases is to avoid mosquito bites.

In line with community health advice, families can protect against mosquito bites by:

- using insect repellent that contains picaridin or DEET on all exposed skin if outdoors when mosquitoes are observed, from October to March
- wearing long, loose-fitting clothing outdoors if possible if mosquitoes are around and covering exposed skin as much as possible. Summer school uniforms, including polos and shorts, can continue to be worn, but students should use insect repellent on exposed skin if mosquitoes are active
- limiting outdoor activity when mosquitoes are active.

Year 7 to 9 Mathematics – SQUIZYA Homework Program

Students from Year 7 to Year 9 will be doing their mathematics homework on the sQuizya website. This is the interactive version of the Maths Mate homework program the school has used for many years.

The current Year 7 group, new to the online sQuizya site, will have received an email via their school email account giving them their passwords to allow them to do this.

Weekly homework tasks will be added by staff and results communicated through Xuno reporting.

There are eight homework tasks per term and at times extra homework may be set on class work being covered.

Due dates for each level:

Year 7 homework will be due by 9:00am on Monday each week. Year 8 and 9 homework will be due on Tuesday by 8:30am each week.

Students in Year 7 will be completing the first of these during class time to help them learn how to navigate the site. Their first independent task is due on Monday 13th February.

The SQUIZYA site also gives students and staff access to a variety of skill building extras.
