Year 8 Outdoor Education

Over the past few weeks the Year 8 OED class have participated in a bike education program that included bike maintenance, changing a tyre, road safety and group riding formations. The class was very fortunate to have Bevan Spencer offer his expertise with these practical sessions and we thank him for volunteering his time to assist our students. The practical riding sessions prepared us for the bike ride to the Granites overnight camp last week. Here are some comments from the class.



Finlay - The ride there took about 2 and a half hours and was quite challenging in some spots like the massive hill at the end but was worth it when we got there. Once we got there we played hide and seek and Natalie won and Hatch and Brooke were 'it'.

For the rest of the night we all sat as a group and just talked until about 9:00pm.

Samuel - The bike ride was really boring, but when we got to the Granites we had a Tee Pee building contest and Owen was bragging about his team winning. 


PG Mild fantasy themes and violence, some scenes may scare young children
