Camps, Sports and Excursions fund eligibility

Below are the criteria used to determine a student's eligibility for the Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF).

Criteria 1 – Eligibility

To be eligible* for the fund, a mature minor of sixteen years of age or over, a parent or legal guardian of a student attending a registered Government or non-government Victorian primary or secondary school must:

- on the first day of Term one, or;
- · on the first day of Term two.
- a) Be an eligible beneficiary within the meaning of the State Concessions Act 2004, that is, be a holder of Veterans Affairs Gold Card or be an eligible Centrelink Health Care Card (HCC) or Pensioner Concession Card (PCC) holder, OR
- b) Be a temporary foster parent, and;
- c) Submit an application to the school by the due date.

Mature minors or parents who receive a Carer Allowance on behalf of a child, or any other benefit or allowance not income tested by Centrelink, are not eligible for the CSEF unless they also comply with one of (a) or (b) above.

Criteria 2 - Be of school age and attend school in Victoria

School is compulsory for all Victorian children aged between six and seventeen years of age inclusive.

For the purposes of CSEF, students may be eligible for assistance if they attend a Victorian registered primary or secondary school. Typically, these students are aged between five and eighteen years inclusive.

CSEF is not payable to students attending pre-school, kindergarten, home schooling, or TAFE.

Eligibility Date

For concession card holders, CSEF eligibility will be subject to the parent/legal guardian's concession card being successfully validated with Centrelink on 29 January 2024 and/or 15 April 2024.

Payment amounts

CSEF payment amount

The CSEF is an annual payment to the school to be used towards camps, sports and/or excursion expenses for the benefit of the eligible student.

- Primary school student rate: \$150.00 per year.
- Secondary school student rate: \$250.00 per year.

The CSEF is paid directly the school and will be allocated by the school towards camps, sports and/or excursion costs for your child.

Ad-Hoc travellers on Buses

Please note that the Durham Ox and Pyramid Hill connecting buses are at capacity in 2024.

Any requests for Ad-Hoc travel must be in to the office a **minimum of 3 days** before travel, to have time to see if there is a spare seat on a particular day.

There will only be a spare seat if the school has had notification of a current passenger being absent, so there is **no guarantee** that your child will be able to access the bus upon your request.

"I like running." Kristie.




SMART SPELLING IN YEAR 1 & 2

Students in Year One and Two have begun the Smart Spelling program. On the first day we practiced our words with chalk outside.








Unit 1 Outdoor and Environmental Studies

On Monday, students participated in surfing and rock climbing in artificial environments. URBN Surf is a wave generating pool, where 10 waves come through in a set for all levels of surfers to ride. The consistency of the waves was a highlight to our students and the ease of walking back through the water to catch the next set was easier than the ongoing waves and pull of the natural environment. We visited Cliffhanger Climbing Centre in Altona which boast to have the highest rock climbing walls in the state. Students scoured the climbs challenging themselves to the different levels. We started at level 10 and some went all the way to level 25. Students will continue to investigate the comparisons in relationships with natural and artificial environments in class next week to consolidate the practical experiences. SURF CAMP - Year 8 Outdoor Ed

On the 21st of February, the students from the Year 8 Outdoor Ed class ventured off to Torquay for their surf camp. The day started off with a long drive straight to our accommodation to set up camp. Our first surfing session was at Cosy Corner, where the waves were quite small and at times challenging to catch. The group was quite competent with everyone having a red-hot crack and spending some time vertically on their surf boards. Afterwards we had some afternoon tea and headed back to the caravan park to enjoy some relaxing time in the pool and the spa. On Day Two of the camp we had our surfing session changed to Anglesea in the hope of catching some better waves. The 6:45am wake up was well and truly worth it with the surfing conditions improving dramatically from the day before. All students impressed with their skills on the incline and keenness to be in the water. Afterwards students were given the opportunity to head to the surf shops and peruse around, as well as get some lunch from up the street. We filled in the early afternoon with sometime in the pool as well as spending some time swimming at the beach. By this stage it was extremely hot and the wind had picked up quite considerably. Unfortunately, this resulted in our Stand-Up Paddleboard session being cancelled in the afternoon. We were all disappointed but had a solid day in the water doing activities to tire us out. We played some cricket along the shore of Anglesea river and headed back to the caravan park again for another relax in the spa before enjoying some of Torquay's finest, Bubba Pizza. A short night walk, topped off by an ice-cream and an early night was on the cards after a fun-filled exhausting day. Day three begun by an early wake up and a jog along the beach with a small group of students. Morale was high, enjoying some breakfast and packing up camp. Once we packed up we headed off to Geelong Adventure Park in what was much cooler conditions than the previous days. Students still had a great time here though partaking in a number of rides and activities. Afterwards we were back in the vehicles, with a short lunch break at Bacchus Marsh, and onwards to Boort.

Thanks to all families for providing some delicious homemade snacks which were shared amongst the group. Also thank you to Brooke Chamberlain for accompanying the group for the three days. Our students are to be congratulated on their behaviour across the three days, we trust they had a positive experience on what was a great camp.
